The two teams, one representing the Army and the other the Air Force, are to play a game Dec. 18 on Kyle Field to decide the Corps championship.

According to head coaches, Ray Graves for the Air Force and Jack Little for the Army, there will be no formal workouts until Monday afternoon. Connie Magouirk, offensive backfield coach for the Army said he would try to be around the practice field to help anyone wishing to begin workouts this weekend.

Coaches Graves and Little have agreed to use a set defense and to employ the same offense. Both teams will run from the straight T. The defense will be a 6-2-2-1.

Both coaches strongly urged their players to begin playing basketball or some other indoor sport over the weekend to get in shape. This will be a big help if the rain continues to prevent workouts, Little said.

This game is to be played in full pads under regulation college rules. The only difference will be in the length of the quarters. They will be changed to 12 minutes instead of 15.

All proceeds from the game and the concessions will go to bolster the Student Aid Fund. This fund is used to make loans to students who are having trouble meeting medical bills. The loans are made on a non-interest, pay as you can basis.

Hayes said he was hampered by lack of height but he should have a pretty good team. He expects to at least hold his own with most other freshman teams on the schedule.

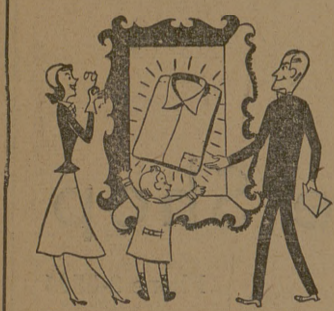
John Floyd, was not available for comment at press time.
