Repair and Painting

Although part of another program, repair work and repainting of buildings helped with the clean-up drive. A new floor was poured in the basement of the Electrical Engineering building. The P. L. Downs Jr. Natatorium was painted outside and in, as was the Agricultural Engineering building.

Insides of the Chemistry Lecture room and of seven dormitories were painted, as were the outsidings of the Petroleum Engineering building, the Cottonseed Products Research Laboratory and 59 student apartment houses in College View.

Currently being remodeled and redecorated are the System Administration building and the Academic building.

In other parts of the System, accumulations of scrap metal were sold for a total of \$2,413.18.

Arlington State Repairs

All buildings at Arlington State College were thoroughly cleaned, had minor repairs made and wooden structures painted.

Grass and weed areas were moved, shrubbery and trees trimmed, and material stored outside was moved into warehouses which were cleared of useless collections, some dating back 30 years or more.

The registrar's office alone disposed of more than a ton of outdated catalogs and records.

Material which required outside storage was placed above-ground to allow for regular mowing and raking.

All 27 field units of the Agricultural Experiment Station cooperated in the System-wide drive and several thousands' of dollars worth of equipment was exchanged with-in parts of that organization alone.

Thousands of acres of land in the sub-stations was improved in appearance and usefulness during the drive.

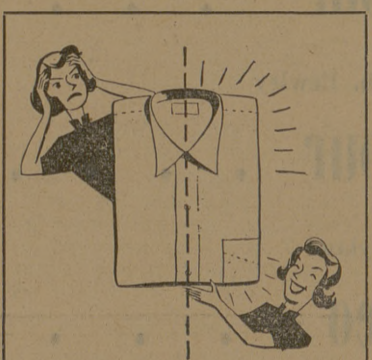
Completion of the clean-up drive during the recent drought will show to even better advantages since most areas of the state are now receiving rain, and plant growth is due to sprout again.

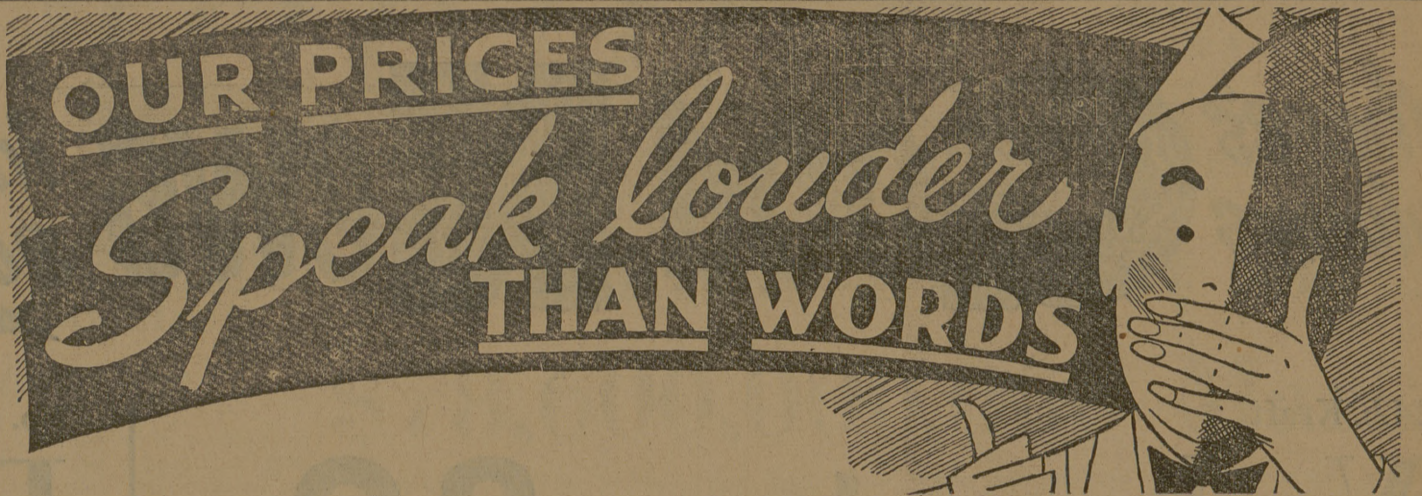
