Sec. Benson Aware Of Falling Prices

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson told farmers today he is fully aware of declining agricultural prices and will use the price support powers of the government to help stabilize farm markets.

This assurance came after a number of congressmen had expressed concern over the agricultural situation and had asked the new GOP farm chief and his aides to consider the matter immediately.

Benson, in a formal statement, did not take as grave a view of the farm price outlook as have some others, particularly farm leaders in Congress.

Chairman Aiken R-Vt of the Senate Agriculture Committee and Sen. Young R-ND have said at recent committee hearings that the farm situation now bears many resemblances to the situation prior to the serious farm depression of the 30's.

Young has been particularly insistent that Benson commit himself to continuance of present high level price supports, scheduled to expire at the end of next year. This Benson has declined to do.

Pressure On Ike To Keep Old Cost Index

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29—(AP)—President Eisenhower was reported Wednesday under strong pressure to revive an abandoned cost of living index on which many wage contracts are hinged. A major aim would be to head off a big pay row in the auto industry.

The pressure, reliably reported from many different quarters, is

being exerted by the auto companies, the railroad unions and some influential senators.

But CIO President Walter Reuther is bitterly opposed to continuation of the old index, and has so told Secretary of Labor Martin P. Durkin.

Critical Decision

The decision which the President makes will be watched closely by those critics, in Congress and elsewhere, who have said the automobile industry and especially General Motors will have too large a voice in the making of policy. The whole question has political overtones which the CIO is believed ready to exploit should Mr. Eisenhower order the old index continued.

The background is this: For three years the Bureau of Labor Statistics has been planning for a new cost of living index designed to measure American spending habits on a more up-to-date basis. It is now ready for publication late next month, in place of the old index.

But more than 3 million workers have labor contracts which tie their wages to the cost of living. And the index which their contracts specify shall be used to make these measurements is the old one. Thus, all these contracts will have to be rewritten and fitted to the new index.
