The students represent 14 nations Pakistan, with seven men, has more students at A&M than any other country.

The collegiate Future Farmers of America dance will be held at 8 p. m. April 18 in Sbsia Hall, said Jack Jumper, member of the band committee.

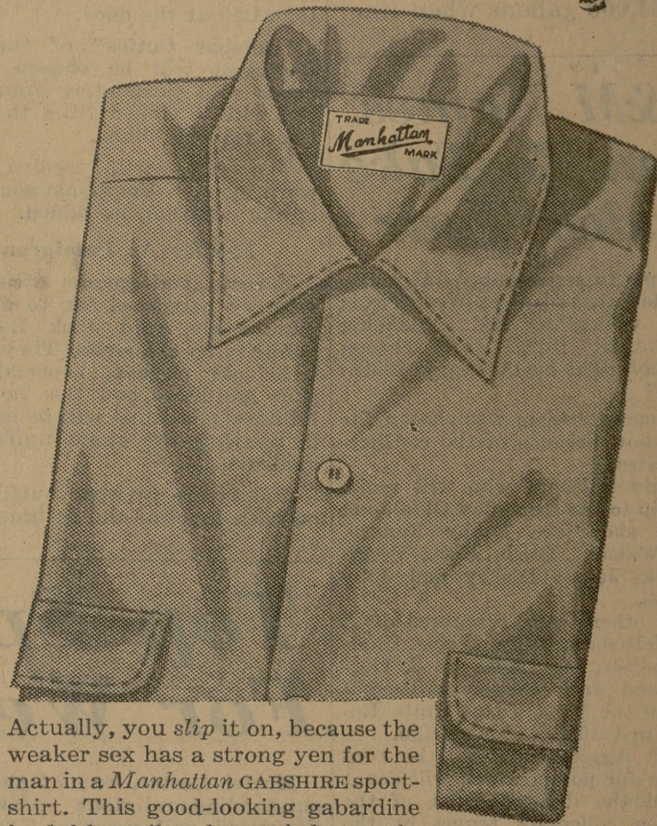
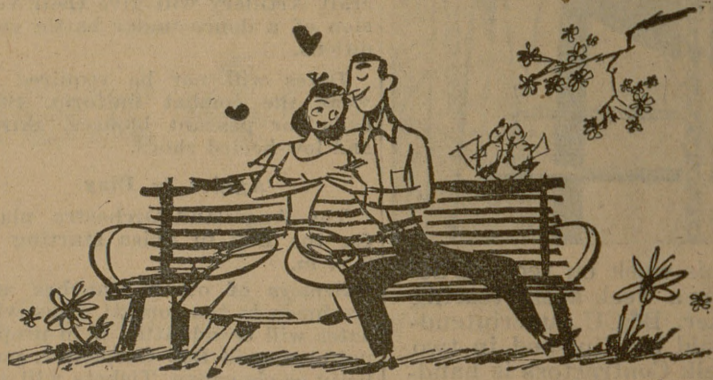

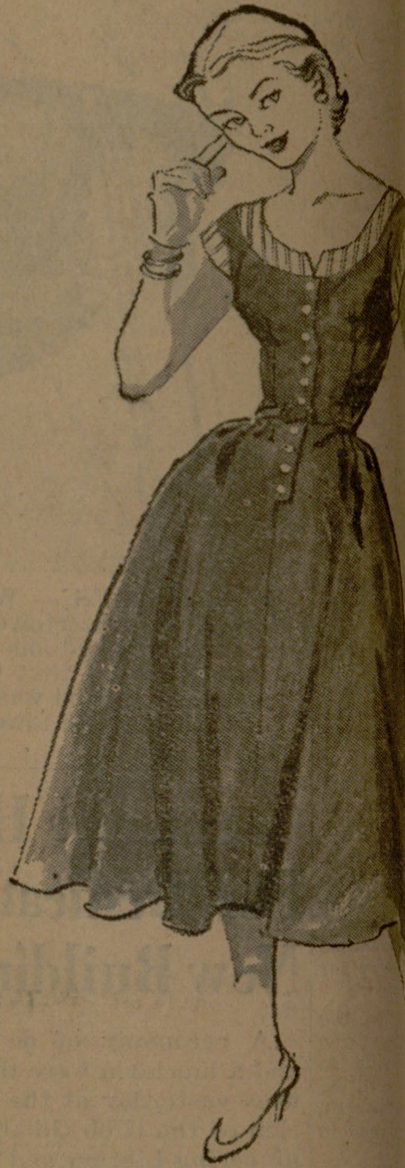
