

Physics, Chem Star In A&S Open House

Geiger counters for measuring radiation, boiling of water by cooling it and a show of chemical magic will highlight the program of the School of Arts and Sciences Open House Saturday.

A cloud chamber to show nuclear collisions, a spectrograph and an electronics demonstration will be shown by the physics department in the Physics Building. The magic

show, in addition to lab miniatures of industrial processes, will be shown in the Chemistry Building.

Coffee will be served in the English and economics departments on the first floor of the Academic Building, where a display of books and materials also will be presented.

General exhibits of classroom work, pictures and other illustrative material will be available in the journalism department. Maps and charts, a planetarium and visits to the cooperative weather station will feature the exhibit of the geography department in Room 108, Chemistry Building.

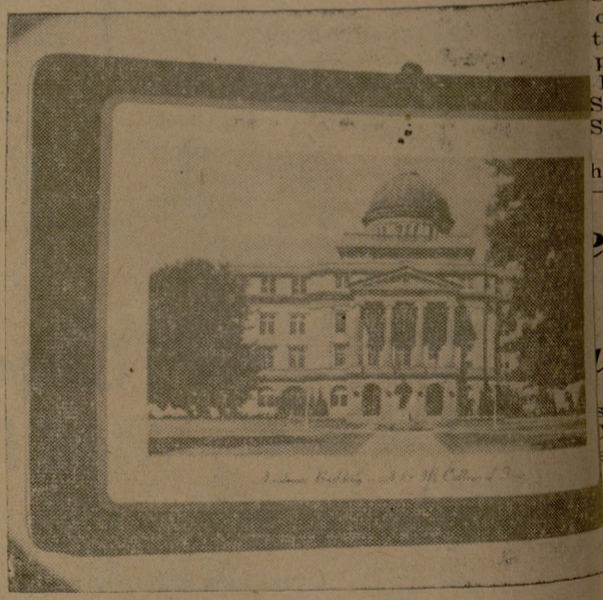
