Cox, state health officer, said food pro-tection and sanitary measures are needed to control the disease. He described dysentery as being an in-fectious disease characterized by dimether nois in the addoman and metal with a cloth dampened

Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more of-ten and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; how-ever, he said it may occur at any age. 
