A new kind of cotton bandage developed recently, saved the Federal Treasury more than five mil lion dollars in 1952,; enough to pay for all the research on cotton at the big New Orleans Laboratory in the past five years.

The armed services have thus far bought more than 13 million of these comfortable bandages. They cost about 25 cents each, compared to 62.5 cents for conventional elas-tic bandages. And the new cotton
