Representatives of the student senate and student life committee took the first step yesterday in re-evaluating their organizations.

They met with the dean of men at 4 p.m. in his office "to iron out all misunderstandings on channels of authority and responsibility." W. L. Penberthy, dean of mean

started the meeting by briefly outlining the history of the organizations, and pointing out that the meeting was a part of the re-evaluation program being carried on by the A&M system. He explained the student senate

is responsible to the dean of men, who in turn is responsible for stu-dent life other than academic.

The question arose on to whom does the student senate refer their actions.

Spike White, manager of student activities, said the student senate advisor tells senate members whom they should see concerning their mmendations.

White said in matters where the senate has no authority the rec-ommendation should be routed through the dean of men.


