# McCulley to Be Polio Chairman For County

William S. McCulley, assistant professor of mathematics will direct the 1954 March of Dimes campaign in Brazos County.

The appointment was announced by J. E. Tatum, chairman of the Brazos county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Tatum said the ability of the National Foundation to make available a vaccine as soon as possible hinges on the success of the March of Dimes.

"Meanwhile", he said "we must use Gamma Globulin to modify the course of polio as much as possible and pay the costs of care for the many already stricken."

Tatum said a larger sum than the \$2,600,000 raised in 1953 must be raised this year. "Realizing this, I am certain that all citizens of Brazos county will follow the leadership of the March of Dimes committee so that the National Foundation may accomplish its objectives", he said.
