The A&M Consolidated Band Boosters club will meet in the high school library at 7:30 p.m. tonight to discuss the forthcoming circus carnival.


The carnival, to be jointly spon-sored by the Band Boosters and the College Station Lions club, will be held on the high school campus March 12.


