At the meeting Mrs. Wharton mentioned the favorable comment sent to the national headquarters in Chicago by the local members concerning the successful concert series which ended last month.

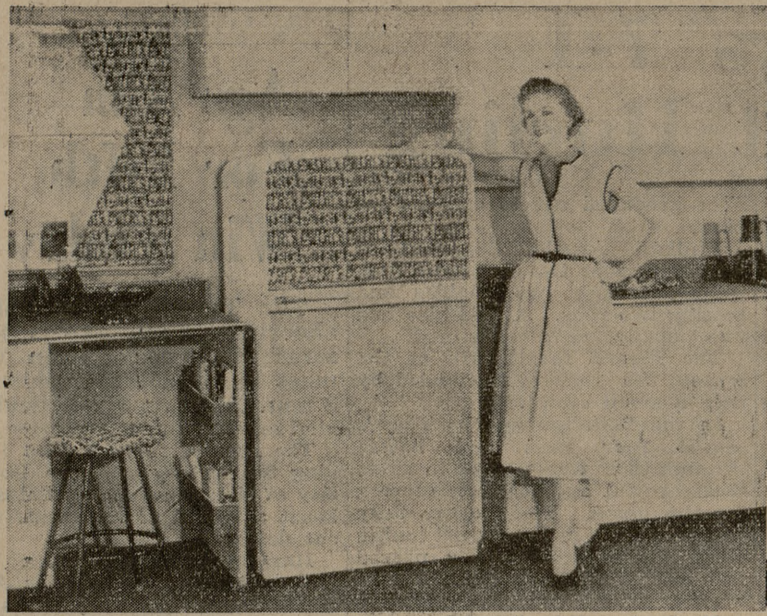
Broadway Musical Set for Town Hall
