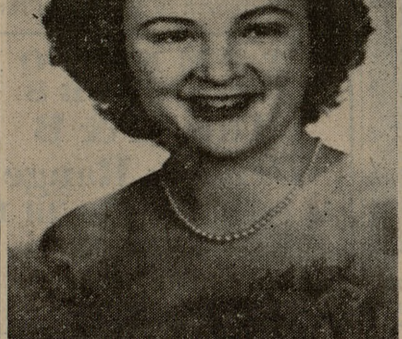

REGALIA FOR COMMENCEMENT

For the Commencement Exercises and Baccalaureate Service in accordance with action taken earlier by the Academic Council, all non-military students who are candidates for degrees will wear academic regalia. Candidates for the Ph.D. degree and candidates for the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine will wear the Doctor's cap and gown. Candidates for the Master's and professional degrees will wear the Master's cap and gown, and those receiving the Bachelor's degree will wear the Bachelor's cap and gown. All military students who are candidates for degrees will wear Uniform No. 1.
