Election Proves Points; Danger in 'Two Camps'

Yesterday's election proved a few things. toward active participation in student elec-The withdrawal of the two non-military students in the run-off indicates that the non-regs are sincere in saying that they do not want to "control" the class officers, or organize a "machine." 


