Panel Decision Clears Air Around Hazing Case

It's still not over, but the air around the hazing case is much clearer now.

Punishment has been given all parties, and the punishment is equal to the act on both sides. The seniors, who broke a state and college law, as well as their cadet officer's oath, have been indefinitely suspended.

The recipients of the hazing, the juniors who really had no alternative except to submit, have not been made ineligible for cadet rank. They have been punished, but their value to the college and the cadet corps has been retained.

The seniors are now appealing the case. If the appeal is unsuccessful, they can still come back to school and finish as soon as

the college approves them. They will have to take one semester over, at the most.

These juniors, and the other juniors in the Ross Volunteers, will probably be the leaders next year in the fight to rid A&M completely of the board.

The best thing about the whole case is the speed with which the college has handled This could have been bad for the college, and it still isn't particularly good, but by getting it over with quickly, the college has shown that it will not tolerate hazing.

When it is all over, it will not be forgotten. It will serve as a reminder. Some day the board, and all other forms of hazing, will be gone from A&M, and this is a big step toward that day.
