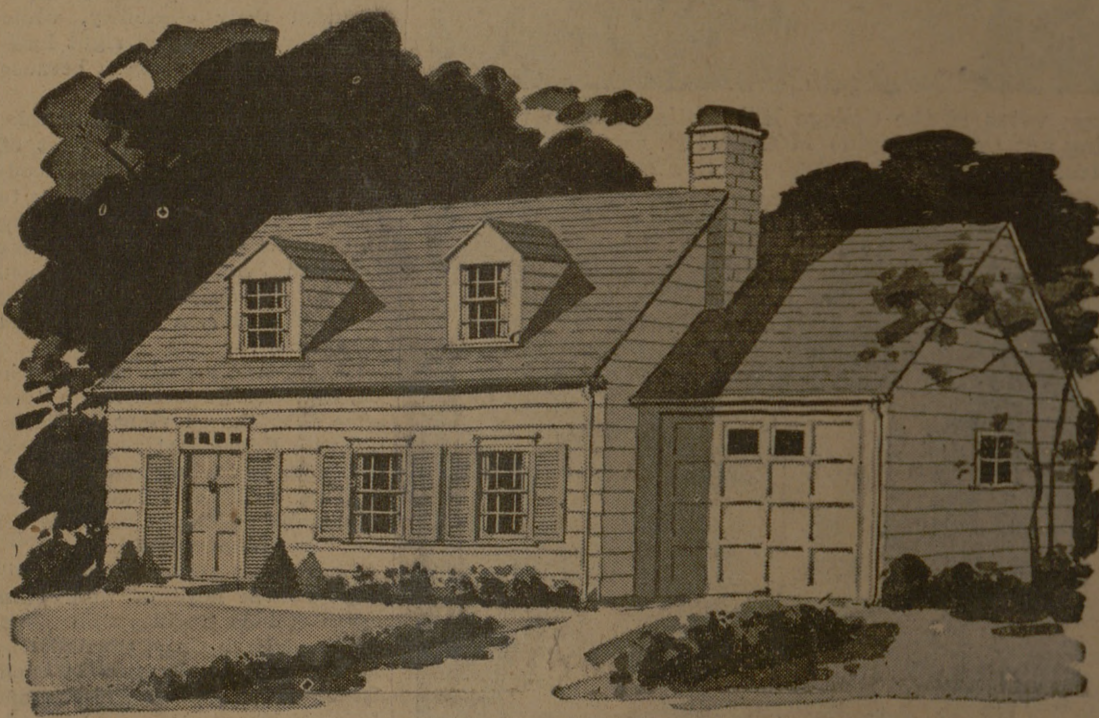

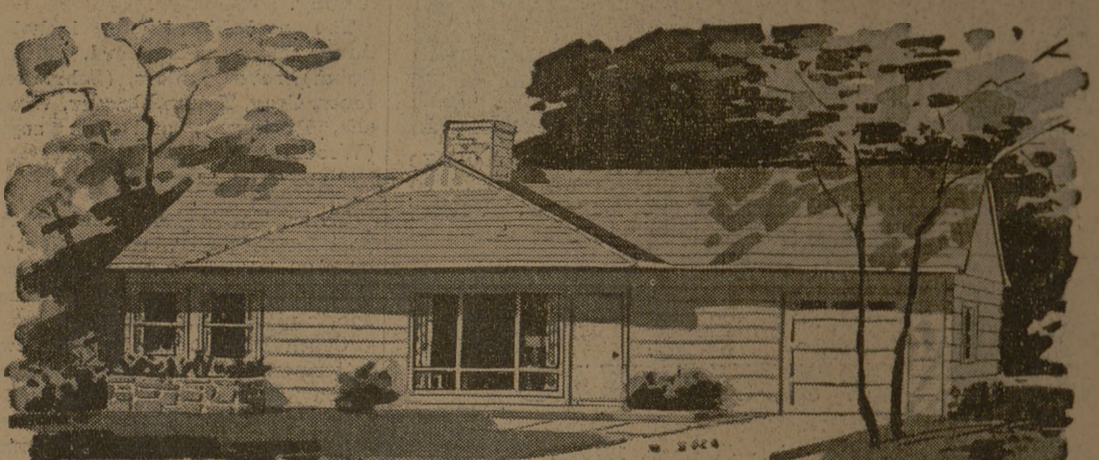

Old Indian Villiage Site May Be Located Near A&M

The possible site of an Indian village is located on the Brazos river just a few miles from the A&M campus.

According to Don R. Collins, senior wildlife major from Houston, two tribes of Indians, the Tawakoni and the Waco, were known to have ranged about the Brazos and Trinity rivers as late as 1946.

These tribes were principally agricultural but also hunted buffalo and other game to a considerable extent.

Collins, while on a weekend field trip in search of arrowheads, saw a large mound near the Brazos that showed possibility of being the former site of a village.

He said he found the area "literally covered" with flint slivers. He also uncovered several finished arrowheads and a few bits of

broken pottery.

The area seemed so productive that Collins has decided to learn as much about College Station Indians as possible.

He, and Jim Hill, junior animal husbandry major from Houston, plan to make a complete survey of the Brazos county area.
