the civilian students be allowed to sit with the cadets. But this immediately drew fire from corps senators who pointed out that there was little way of telling the civilian classes apart except in the case of seniors wearing rings.

A system of having each civilian student wear a different colored card to represent his class was suggested by Benefield. The plan was tried last year, and the civilian house masters distributed the cards in their dormitories. However, the plan was used only once. Interjected between the argu-

ments over what to do with the civilian students was a comment by civilian Senator George Allen. He said, "I hate to see any dissention between the corps and the non-corps students." One other proposal, also present-

ed by Benefield, was to have a drawing for seats in the student section. The main objection to the plan was how students would take dates to the games if there were only one seat to a student.

After the debate over the matter ended, the senate appointed members to the seating committee, but the entire composition of the group was not named since several civilian senators remain to be elected. Appointed were Allen, Benefield, Bob Alcock, Gus Mijalis and Jim Rowland. No chairman was named.

In other action by the senate, Ronnie Miller, Gene Stubblefield, Buddy Vance and Dave Parnell were appointed to the college's traffic committee.

A budget committee composed of Treasurer Eversburg, Jerry Johnson and Specia was named to study the allotment of the senate's \$760 budget, approved by the Student Life committee last spring.

No date for the election of the civilian senators was set, but Ramsey said the executive committee of the senate would pick a date
