Homer A. Hunter, consulting engineer of Dallas, discussed with the council the three proposed plans for the sewerage system. Plan I and II were not considered suitable because of the added cost of installing pump stations to handle the flow of sewerage.

Plan III is designed to serve all of the presently developed areas of the city and future development along any of the watersheds south of the city. This system consists of two outfall lines. One would begin east of Consolidated school and run east and southeast to a plant located outside the

The second line follows the present location from College Park southeast to the cemetery and then eastward to join the other at the

Plan III involves no pumping but requires greater lengths of lines. The initial cost of the pumping
