Music Group To Present Duo-Pianists

The College Station-Bryan civic music association will present Ferrante and Teicher, duo-pianists, at the first concert of the season at 8:15 p.m. tomorrow at the Stephen F. Austin auditorium.

Arthur Ferrante and Louis Teicher have had parallel careers: both started to play the piano without written music at the age of two; at six, each was composing original compositions, as well as appearing in public recitals. They met at the Juilliard school of music in New York city where they started their formal musical education as children. At Juilliard they formed their two-piano team. They continued their education on scholarships and received awards for outstanding excellence. Both graduated with the highest honors the school could confer on them.

After graduation they joined the faculties of the Juilliard and Manhattan schools of music, still continuing their duo. In 1946 Ferrante and Teicher made their professional debut, and only a few months later concert demands forced them to resign their teaching positions in order to devote all of their time to their performances.

Ferrante and Teicher have been heard on ABC's "Piano Playhouse," and currently are making regular appearances on the Garry Moore television show.

SWC To Observe Sportsmanship

This week is Sportsmanship week all over the Southwest conference, with each of the seven conference schools making a special effort to present the work of the Southwest Conference Sportsmanship committee to its students.

At A&M, the yell practices this week will be dedicated to Sportsmanship, and special ceremonies will be observed during the half-time of the A&M-Baylor football game Saturday.

Saturday is conference Sportsmanship day, and A&M and Baylor will jointly sponsor the half-time activities. The game will be played in Waco.

The committee meets three times a year. The fall meeting will be in Fayetteville, Ark., Oct. 30. The University of Arkansas is president school of the committee this year, a post that rotates in alphabetical order.

The best-known activity of the Sportsmanship committee is the awarding of the annual Sportsmanship trophy at the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas.

The three-foot-high trophy goes to the school that has displayed the best sportsmanship during the year, in the opinion of the 68 voters.

Voters, who include the members of the committee, conference officials, and each school's dean of students, alumni secretary, and athletic director, are instructed to vote on the sportsmanship of the students, the fans, and the townspeople, as well as the athletic teams.

The committee is composed of students holding these positions at each conference school.

The permanent records of the organization are kept at A&M, and the executive secretary of the committee is always an A&M student. This year's executive secretary is Ralph Cole, a junior agricultural journalism major from Muenster.
