Turkey Leftovers

It's pretty distressing to have about a fourth of the Thanksgiving turkey left to eat for a week or so after the big dinner is over. Sandwiches often result from wondering "just what will I do with all that turkey." However sandwiches get rather dull for lunch, and supper too, so I looked through my tid-bit files and found a couple of recipes that should make that main dish of turkey left-overs just about as delicious as the real Thanksgiving dinner.

Turkey Turnovers
1 1/2 cups minced cooked turkey
3/4 cup thick white sauce
1 1/2 tablespoons minced parsley
1/2 teaspoon onion juice
salt and pepper

Prepare your favorite pie-dough recipe. Roll out pastry, and cut into squares. Cover half of each square with the turkey filling but

do not bring filling out to the edge. Fold over and press edges of pastry together, using a floured fork. Prick each turnover with a fork; place on baking sheet, and bake in a hot oven until brown. This recipe serves four.

Almond Turkey Delight
3 cups cooked converted rice
1/2 cup almonds
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup flour
1 ten-ounce can consommé
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon salt
1 to 2 cups small slices (or diced) cooked turkey

Sliver almonds and brown lightly in melted butter or margarine. Remove from pan. Blend flour with remaining fat. Add consommé and water slowly and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sauce is thickened. Add salt. Place
