## At Least A Start

The student Agriculture council, in an attempt to devise an honor code for A&M, has come up with a plan which takes a different look at this whole business of honesty. Instead of trying to have a code which is void if only one student fails to sign the pledge, this new idea is in effect for only those who sign—the others, by implication, are free to cheat.

## Johnson Will Head A&M FFA Chapter

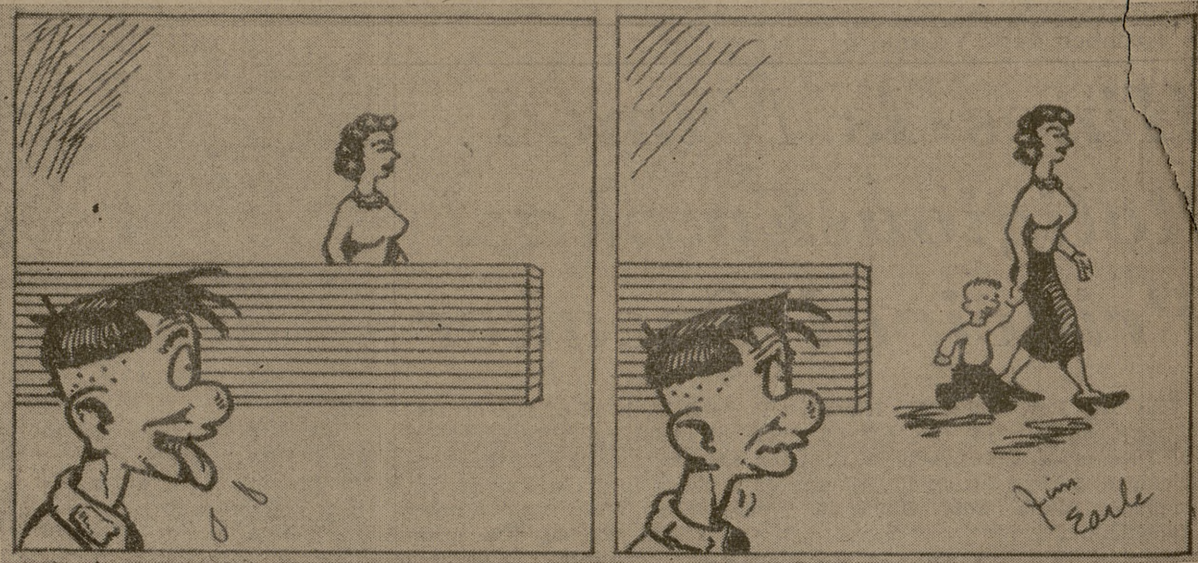
Jerry K. Johnson was elected president recently of the A&M Collegiate FFA chapter.

Print this in that garbage can liner you call a student publication.

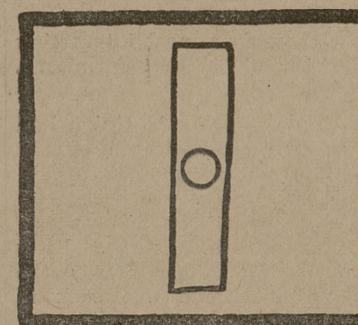
