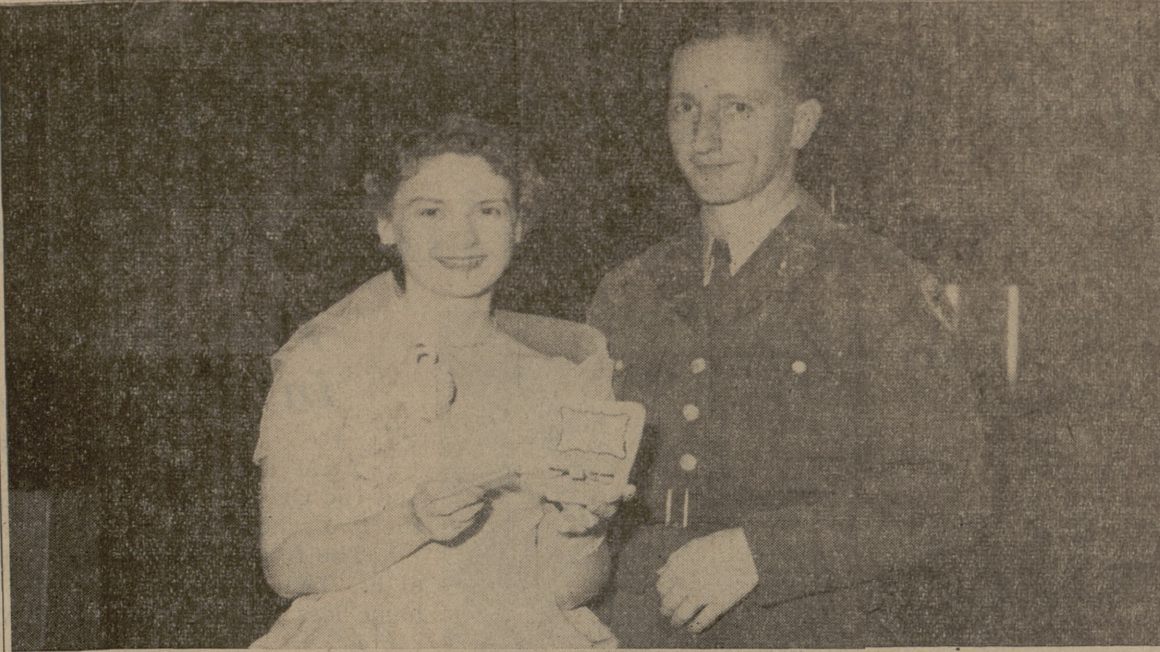

shampoo and wave set, to be given by the House of Beauty; and a 33 1/2 long playing record, by Shaffer's Book Store.

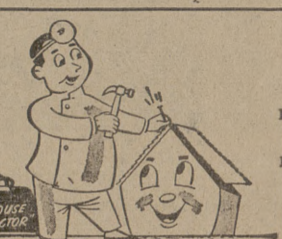

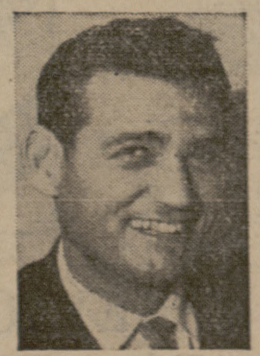
