The Texas senate has approved state education funds, and approva compromise version of a bill to ing the starting and discontinuing set up a Texas commission of high- of courses after Sept. 1, 1956. er education to coordinate the activities of the state's nine senior colleges and universities, including ·A&M.

Sen. A. M. Aiken and Sen. Ottis agreed on the compromise.

The bill was approved 24-3. The bill, which now goes to the house, calls for a 15-member commission to be appointed by the governor for six-year terms. Members would be from different parts of the state, and could not be professional educators. Among the commission's duties would be a continuing study of the state's higher education needs, review of the budget requests of the nine schools, development of for-
