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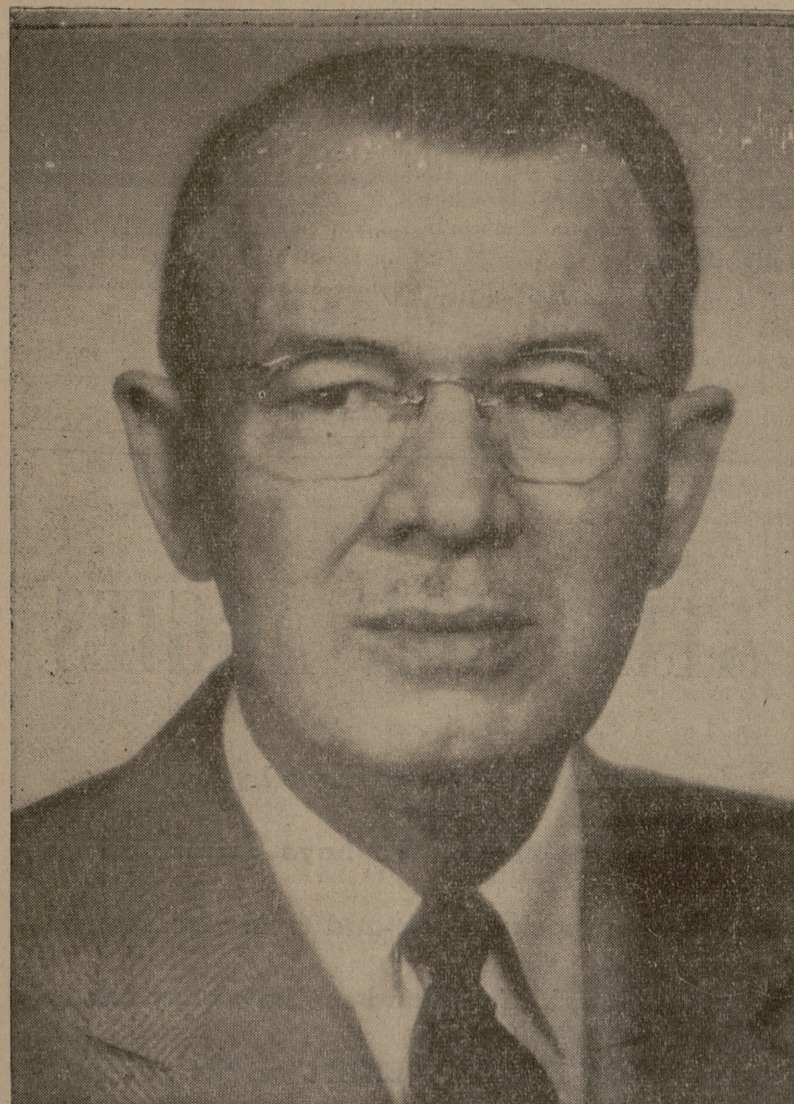
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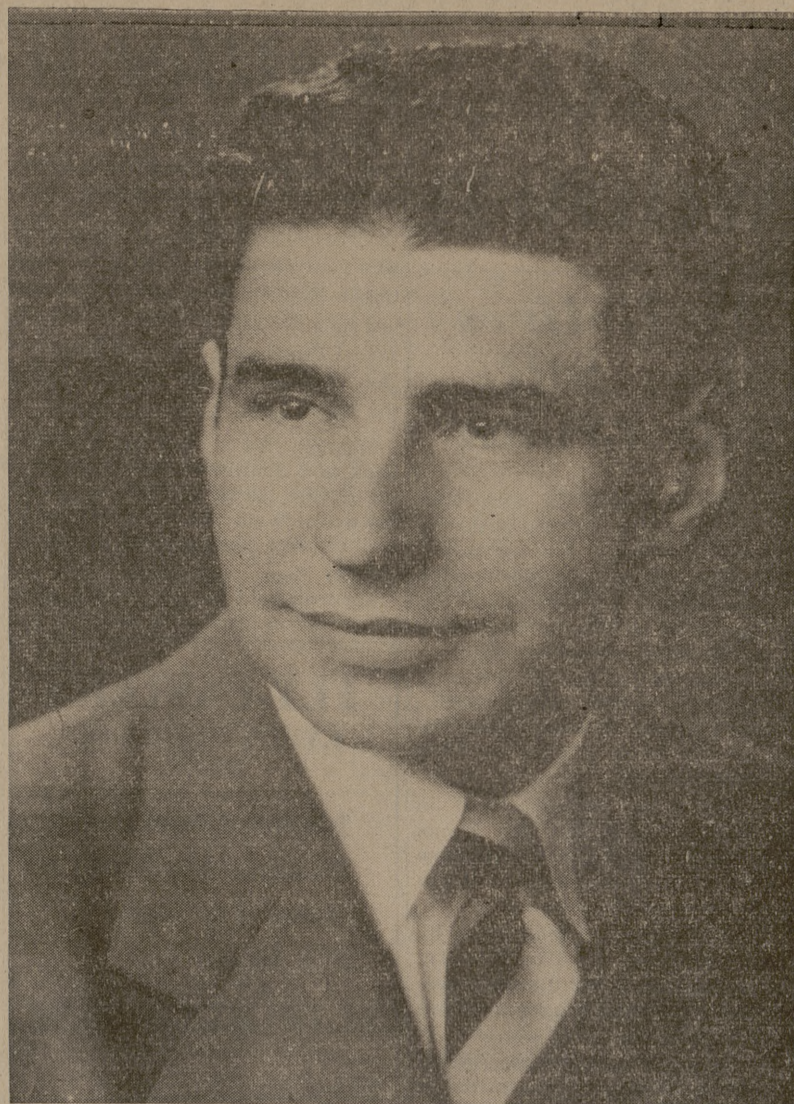

puts the president of the council on equal footing with the colonel of the corps, and that this makes the council a "permanent organization." He also said there are now five corps members in the senate for each civilian member.

"In the Student Life committee action on our request, the corps was against it and the reason was obvious," he said. "Our intentions should be directed toward the sen-

ate representation. What I would like to see is for us to have fair representation in the senate."

Cocanougher explained that he wanted proportionate representation and not necessarily equal membership.

"If there are more civilian students, then we should have more senators; but if there are more corps students, then they should have more senators," he said. "I want fair representation."

The motion to exclude the Student Life committee members if the SLC recommendation went into effect was made by Hugh Lanktree. The motion passed by a 10-0 vote.

Robert O. Murray, civilian dormitory counselor, suggested that the council send a letter of appeal to the Student Life committee.

Burl Purvis moved such an appeal be sent to the SLC and a copy of it go to the Academic council.

Jones said, "I don't see why if our reasons are good enough we can't get it." He then moved that the letter be worded to mean the council would like to have the civilian SLC members elected from the council, but if this did not get approval, then the council would like for the members to be elected at large.

His motion passed 8-2. In other action, the council voted to appoint a civilian chaplain and committee was set up to appoint a man for next year. The requirements, as outlined by the council, are as follows:

He must be a professed Christian; must be sensitive and receptive to the needs of the students; must be well-liked, able to get along with others; must have a 1.0 grade point ratio; must live in a civilian dormitory; and may be of any class.

Anyone interested in applying for the post can contact John Henderson or J. Gordon Gay, YMCA secretary.

The function of the chaplain would be to advise on the spiritual welfare of the civilian students, arrange Bible studies in the civilian dormitories, work with the corps chaplain in arranging honor guards and other details for Silver Taps ceremonies, be responsible for returning thanks in the civilian dining hall, and in general be the civilian student's liaison in all religious matters.

He would also be available to give invocations and benedictions at public functions, as requested by the college officials.

WASHINGTON—Military leaders have told Congress the mammoth Russian army is virtually on a war footing and that Red China's air force could be doubled or tripled "overnight" by the Soviets. The reports were made to a House Ap-

ropriations subcommittee at secret sessions last February but were not made public until yesterday.

WASHINGTON—The United States was understood yesterday to have decided against any direct talks with Red China unless

the Communists make more conciliatory gestures.

SAN ANGELO—A former Houston cab driver testified yesterday that Harry Washburn jr. offered him money to kill Harry Weaver, San Angelo architect. The testimony came as Judge Joe L. Mays conducted a hearing on whether to set bond for Washburn, who is charged with murder in the Jan. 19 car-bomb slaying of Mrs. Weaver, his former mother-in-law.

MOSCOW—A joint session of the Foreign Affairs committees of both houses of the Soviet Parliament yesterday recommended that the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet cancel the British-Soviet alliance.
