CS Team Loses 4-3 to Bryan LL

A leaky infield spelled doom for the hopes of the American League South, College Station Little League All-Stars, as an all-star team from Bryan eked out a 4 to 3 win Tuesday night at the Little League Park in the city.

Thus the National League East, Bryan, team met the National League West of Bryan last night in the district playoffs. The West team won 8 to 2.

Tuesday night's game was a pitcher's duel all the way between Condy Pugh of the local team and Bryan's Tom Stockton. Four errors by two different men at third base brought the end of the trail for the CS team.

Both teams collected four hits, but the Bryan team played flawless ball while College Station was making five errors. The winning run came in on an error in the sixth inning, a throwing error by third baseman Bobby Adams that allowed David Simmons to score from first.

College Station started out rather tamely, with the first two men going down on strikes. Pugh, however, brought the large crowd (the largest ever at the park) to its feet with a towering wallop, high over the centerfield fence.

Pugh completely smothered the Bryan team through the first four innings, not allowing a run or a hit and striking out seven men. His no-hit, no-run game went to pot in the fifth inning, helped along considerably by an error. Eddie Zatopek opened with a walk, Willie Kalinec struck out, then Zubik bounced a single off of Adam's glove at third. Scanlin then doubled in both runners, took third on the throw to the plate which was taken by the third baseman, and came home when Adams threw wildly to home.

Trailing 3 to 1 going into the last half of the fifth, the local team got life when Adams opened with a single to left. Johnnie Williams smashed a double to right center, scoring Adams, and went to third on the throw home. He scored as

Joe Olian was being thrown out at first.

In the Bryan half of the sixth, Simmons singled with two away. Zatopek hit to Adams at third, who threw low to first. The ball bounced into foul territory down the first-base line. Simmons scored what turned out to be the winning run.

Stockton got the College Station team out in order in the last half of the inning, and the ball game was over.

Pugh had 12 strikeouts and issued 2 walks. Stockton had 9 whiffs and gave out 5 free passes.

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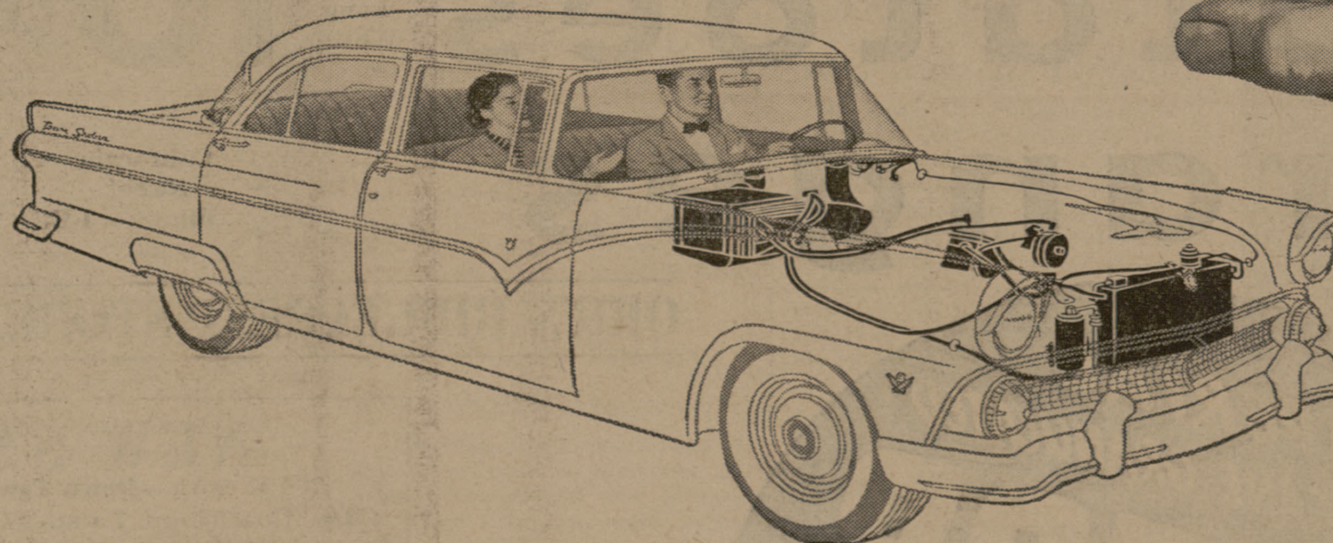
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
