
Transfers, **Fish Boost** Enrollment

A&M's enrollment for the fall semester, as of yesterday, was 6,803. For the same period in 1954 the enrollment was 6,217, according to H. L. Heaton, registrar.

Included in the total registration are 1,928 freshmen and 331 transfer students from senior and junior colleges. This includes 122 from senior colleges and 209 from junior colleges.

For the same period in 1954 there were 1,671 freshmen enrolled and 77 transfers from senior colleges and 143 transfers from junior colleges.
