SAIGON, South Viet Nam-The Vietminh Communists pparently have failed in their widely advertised campaign to infiltrate South Viet Nam. This fact emerges from Sunday's Chief of State Baco Dai and name anti-Communist Premier Ngo Dinh Diem to the post. Diem will proclaim free Viet Nam a Republic Wedresday and become its first president. If returns from the balloting are any criterion, it will be one of the most solidly anti-Communist republics in Asia.


