He was the only member of the American forces to receive all three of the nation's highest military decorations: the Distinguished Service Medal, the Distinguished Service Cross and the Congressional Medal of Honor.

He became president of the company in 1939, and is a trustee of Rice Institute and a regent of the University of Houston. #### '57 Class Selling **Aggie Song Album**


The Class of '57 is selling the world's largest selling college album, "The Songs of Texas A&M," as a project to raise funds for the class treasury.
