Expenses for the conference total about \$12,000, which was raised through the efforts of A&M students from 15 business men, firms and founda-tions in the state. Working on their own time, much of it during last summer's vacation, and largely at their own expense, students raised the needed money in three months. With the money came other help, as top industrialists lent their aid in lining up national figures. Foundations loaned experienced consultants to help guide the program, and some of the early backers of SCONA called friends and persuaded them to join in financing the project.


to citizens of College Station to give what they could to help Mrs.




