Thomas William Taylor, building products and marketing major from Rocksprings, was taken to the Austin hospital Wednesday, after Dr. J. E. Marsh, head of the College Hospital, had diagnosed his case as polio, the first case this year in Braozs County.

Taylor, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas L. Taylor, had gone to Houston last weekend to see his girl friend, and had become ill while there. A doctor in that city told him that he had the flu.
