Since 1949, the Texas Engineering Experiment Station has conducted a program of research on problems of natural lighting, natural ventilation, and sound control in the design of buildings, particularly public school buildngs, for Texas conditions. One of the significant products of this research has been the development of facilities and techniques for studying both the distribution of daylight within and the natural air movement through buildings by means of scale models. The application of these techniques to a variety of practical daylighting problems will be discussed by Reed and Nowak.


