

Methodist Men Feature Reagan Brown Tonight

Reagan Brown, new extension sociologist of A&M will be the guest speaker before the Methodist Men of the A&M Methodist Church in College Station at their dinner meeting at 6:30 p.m. tonight in the Fellowship Hall.

The speaker will be received by the Rev. Nolan R. Vance, pastor of the church, and introduced by Dr. John Kincannon, president of Methodist Men. Dr. Kincannon was aided in arranging this program by a permanent committee consisting of Dr. J. H. Southern, Fred R. Brison and Barney Welch.

In addition to having professional experience in rural sociology as a county agent in Kaufman and Caldwell Counties, Brown has been active as a religious lay leader. He was district Methodist lay leader of the Greenville district from 1949 to 1951 and for the period 1953 to 1955 was charge lay leader for the Lockhart Methodist Church. 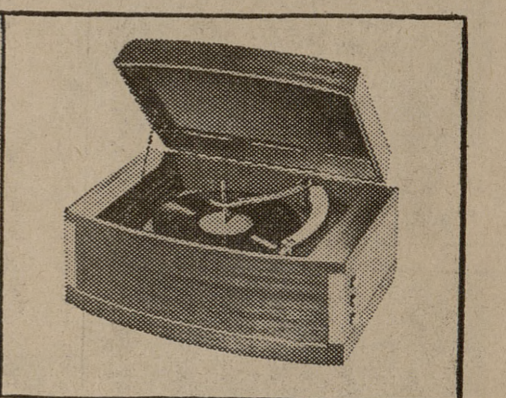
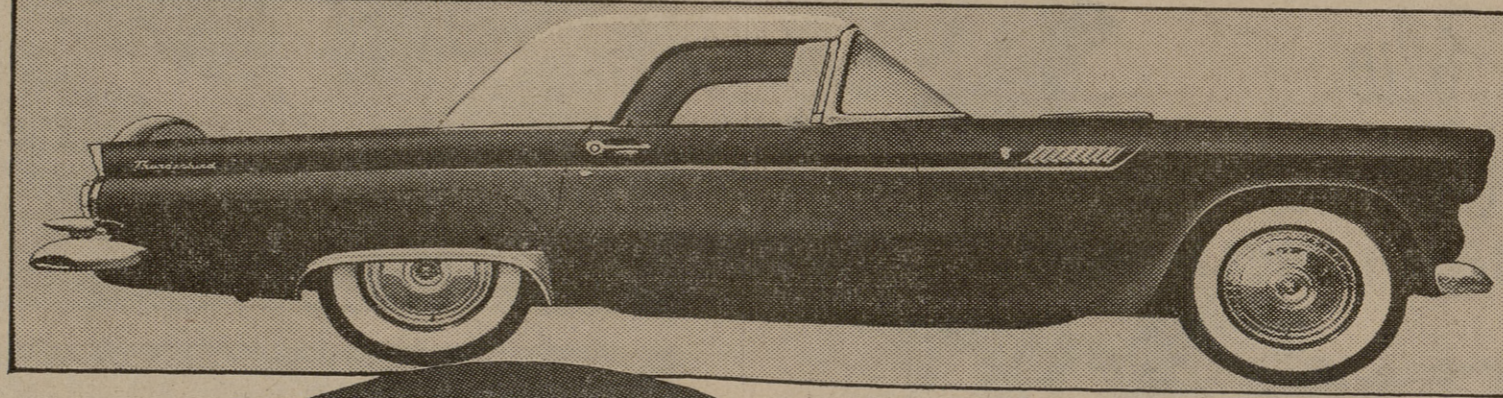
