Ags Lose Home, But Not Desire

There may be no place like home, but the Aggie basketball team is having a hard time finding one, temporarily at least.

The Southwest Conference's fourth place quintet could use only half of the White Coliseum floor Monday afternoon because of workmen preparing for Tuesday night's Town Hall program. Yesterday Coach Ken Loeffler's charges had to move to DeWare Field House—again because of Town Hall.

But only a short time after arriving at DeWare the intramural cage teams took over the floor for their daily games, and Loeffler was forced to give up practice for the day.

THE AGGIES will be shooting for their first road victory of the season Saturday night against Baylor's erratic Bears. The Cadets have won six of seven starts at home and are undefeated in SWC games at home.

A&M has a 3-3 slate in conference games so far. Baylor lost to Arkansas, 31-36, last night and is tied for last place in loop standings with Texas. Both have won one and dropped six.

BILL BROPHY and Ken Hutto got words of praise from Loeffler for their fine play this season. Brophy, currently leading the Aggies in scoring, jumped to eighth place among SWC point makers over the season. His 33 point spree against Houston last week ran his season total to 228 points.

"If we can get some good board play against Baylor I think we'll make a good showing," Loeffler said. "Fritzie Connally and George McHaffey have been taking a terrific beating on the boards this year. I just hope they can manage to rebound Saturday."

D-Inf. Grabs League Crown

Led by Ken Kuykendall, D-Infantry's unbeaten gridders edged Sqd. 19 by two decisive penetrations for a league title in upperclassman football yesterday. Other Infantry standouts were Don Butter and Andy Anderson.

Mighty Leggett Hall trounced Walton, 12-0, in Civilian football as Clayton Mohle's adept ball-handling completely baffled Leggett's previously undefeated opponents. Walton crossed the Leggett 40-yard line only twice and never once reached the 20.

John Rouse, Rex Ayres, and Bill Perry also played good ball for Leggett. James Vickery and Warren Grant were mainstays in the Walton lineup.

DALLAS—Jim Krebs scored 50 points last night to set a new SWC scoring record as league leading SMU won a wild basketball game from Texas, 109-99. Krebs scored 20 field goals, mostly on layups, and hit 10 of 11 free throws. The Ponies showed exceptional marksmanship, hitting 61 per cent of their field goal attempts. The Longhorns, whose Slater Martin was a co-holder of the old record of 49 with Dick O'Neal of TCU, concentrated on keeping Krebs from breaking the mark. Krebs outjumped the entire Texas team to set the record with about two minutes to play. Ray Downs led Texas scorers with 32 points.

FAYETTEVILLE—Arkansas remained a game behind SMU in the race for the SWC title by outlasting Baylor, 36-31, last night in a slow contest. Arkansas' Manuel Whitley led all scorers with 13 points and nabbed nine rebounds to dominate board play. Center Louis Estes was high for the Bears with 10 points. The Hogs tallied only 13 points in the second half, and Baylor 12.

Tigers Win 45-37; Cinch Tie for Title

Jumping off to a commanding first-half lead, A&M Consolidated's Tigers breezed to a 45-37 win over the Waller Bulldogs to insure at least a tie for the District 25-A title and remain undefeated in league action last night in Tiger gym.

In the preliminary the Tiger 'B' team ran their win streak to four straight as they edged Waller, 17-16.

Manuel Garcia meshed eight points in a torrid second period that saw Coach Larry Hayes' Tigers hit 18 points while holding the Bulldogs to five to run up a 26-10 lead at the intermission.

Garcia and Norman Floeck scored two quick field goals apiece to open the second half and push Consolidated's margin to 34-10, their largest of the game. Waller pulled

ed up to 41-23 at the end of the third quarter and posted its final points against the Tiger reserves in the final period.

Garcia led the night's scoring with 16 points, followed by teammate Floeck, the Tigers' leading season scorer, who dropped in 15. (See TIGERS, Page 4)

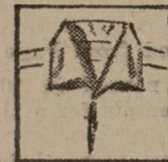
