Of course, the Communist party profits from the riots in our nation. But, if there were no persons like you there would be no rioting, and communists would have nothing to criticize.
Persons like you are making a martyr out of Autherine. And I don't see why Autherine cannot get a good college education in a "white" college. She wants to go to that institution because it has better facilities and teachers than the Negro colleges. Why deny her the right to knowledge when she is a human being just like you?
I don't know where you get your superiority complex. Nazis thought they were superior in the Olympics of 1936. But an American Negro, Jesse Owens, showed them a physical superiority in three events—giving honors to the United States and bringing the American flag to wave at the top of the mast in Berlin stadium.
Let's all be brothers like Jesus Christ taught us. Let's not fight each other.
You called those rioting mobs in Alabama your fellow Americans. They are, even though they are acting in a most un-American manner. And Autherine Lucy is your fellow American, too. Fullerton is not blasting his fellow Americans; he is blasting people with narrow minds and senseless prejudices.
We are in an age of progress, so why not let the Negro share with us this progress to make a better, stronger and more prosperous America.

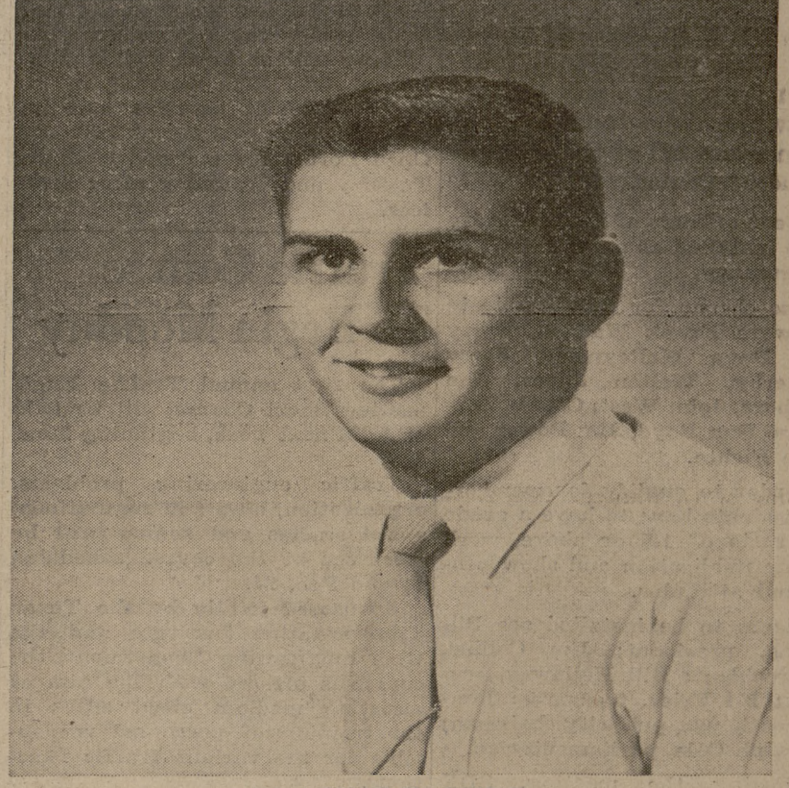
