JERUSALEM — Syrian gunfire downed an Israeli plane yesterday in the tense Galilee region. Fears again mounted over possibility of general Arab-Israeli warfare. Israeli officials said the plane was machine-gunned while flying over its own territory in upper Galilee. They said the pilot was wounded and the plane made an emergency landing on the Israeli side.

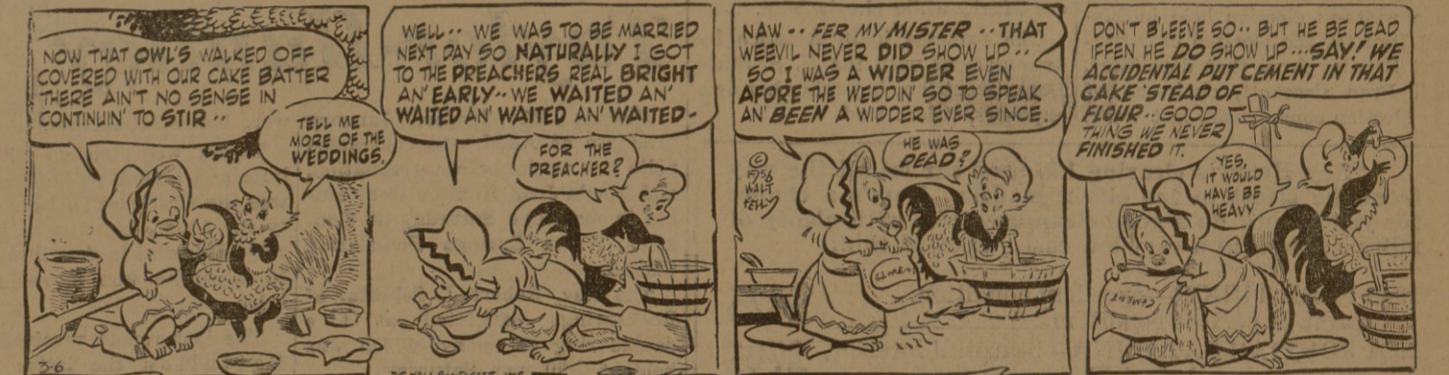
