### TALLERENE

3 T. fat  
1 medium onion, minced  
1 lb. hamburger  
1 can tomato soup  
1 t. salt  
2 cups uncooked noodles  
1 can (2 cups) whole grain corn  
1 cup chopped ripe olives  
1 cup grated sharp cheese  
1 cup cold water

Melt fat in Dutch oven or heavy skillet and brown onion and meat. Add soup, water, noodles, corn, olives and salt. Sprinkle cheese over mixture and cook over low heat until noodles are tender. Serves 6-8 people.

### TWENTY-FOUR HOUR SALAD

1-12 oz. can pineapple tidbits  
2 eggs, slightly beaten  
¼ cup sugar  
¼ cup flour  
Dash salt  
¼ cup lemon juice  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
16 marshmallows, quartered or ¼ lb.  
½ cup chopped walnuts  
1 cup grapes, chopped

A day ahead begin draining pineapple, reserving ½ cup syrup. Mix syrup in saucepan with eggs, sugar, flour and salt. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly 'til very thick and smooth. Stir in lemon juice and refrigerate until cool. Fold in whipped cream. Lightly mix in pineapple, marshmallows, nuts, grapes. Refrigerate 24 hours. Spoon into hollowed pineapple shell or lettuce cups on tray. Serves 8-10 persons.

### FRUIT COBBLER

1 large can peaches  
1 T. corn starch  
Butter  
Nutmeg  
1 cup sugar

Drain juice from peaches (or apricots) and add water to make two cups. Mix water, juice and cornstarch. Add ¼ cup of sugar and chopped fruit. Dot generously with butter and sprinkle with nutmeg. Top with latticed hot water pastry (recipe given below), and sprinkle with nutmeg, ¼ cup sugar and dot with butter. Cook a 45° until crust is done.

### HOT WATER PASTRY

This recipe is enough for three cobblers, pies or other pastry recipes and is ideal because it will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.  
3 cups sifted flour  
1 cup Crisco  
1½ T. salt  
½ t. baking powder  
½ cup boiling water

Place all ingredients in bowl and add boiling water, mixing well. Form a ball. Place in refrigerator until firm. Cut and use as desired.

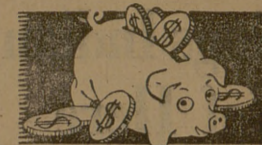
