A group of local Explorer Scouts are planning an "Adventure Trail" trip to Canada this summer. The "jumping-off point" for the Canada wilderness trek will be the Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base near Ely,

From the base camp the boys will proceed into the Quetico Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada. The entire trip is expected to take from 21 to 24 days, including 10 days in Canada.

Each boy is expected to earn all he can toward paying his expenses for the trip. He must earn at least one-third of the \$76.50 cost to be eligible for the trip.
