The purpose of the program is to encourage interest and participation in science by more and better students. It provides an opportunity for students to express their interest and be properly recognized for their achievements.

The fair was sponsored locally by K. C. Morgan, A&M Consolidated science instructor. Mr. Morgan will accompany the students to Galveston.
