Teachers' salaries at A&M Consolidated Schools are lowest of 17 comparable-sized surrounding towns and consolidations, a report of the Education Commission of College Station reveals.

A study of schools in seven other small college towns in comparison with the local school further disclosed that A&M Consolidated was second low in the amount of funds raised by taxes.

The Education Commission, with Dr. Charles LaMotte presiding, has just completed a six weeks' study of Consolidated and Lincoln Schools and is meeting this afternoon to present their recommendations to the board of education.

Last Thursday the commission completed its first-hand study with an inspection of Lincoln School.

The group looked over facilities and heard reports on teaching methods and courses offered by Mrs. Julia Campbell, Miss Thy Owens, and Lawrence King.

W. A. Tarrow, Lincoln principal, reported on enrollment, job-plan-

ning and the percentage of college work done by Lincoln graduates.

In a previous meeting the commission studied the financial report of the school system as presented by Dr. L. S. Richardson, superintendent of the A&M Consolidated School, learning how the district acquires and spends its funds.

Other changes include closing two of the three double doors at the entrance to the library. The center doors will be left open.

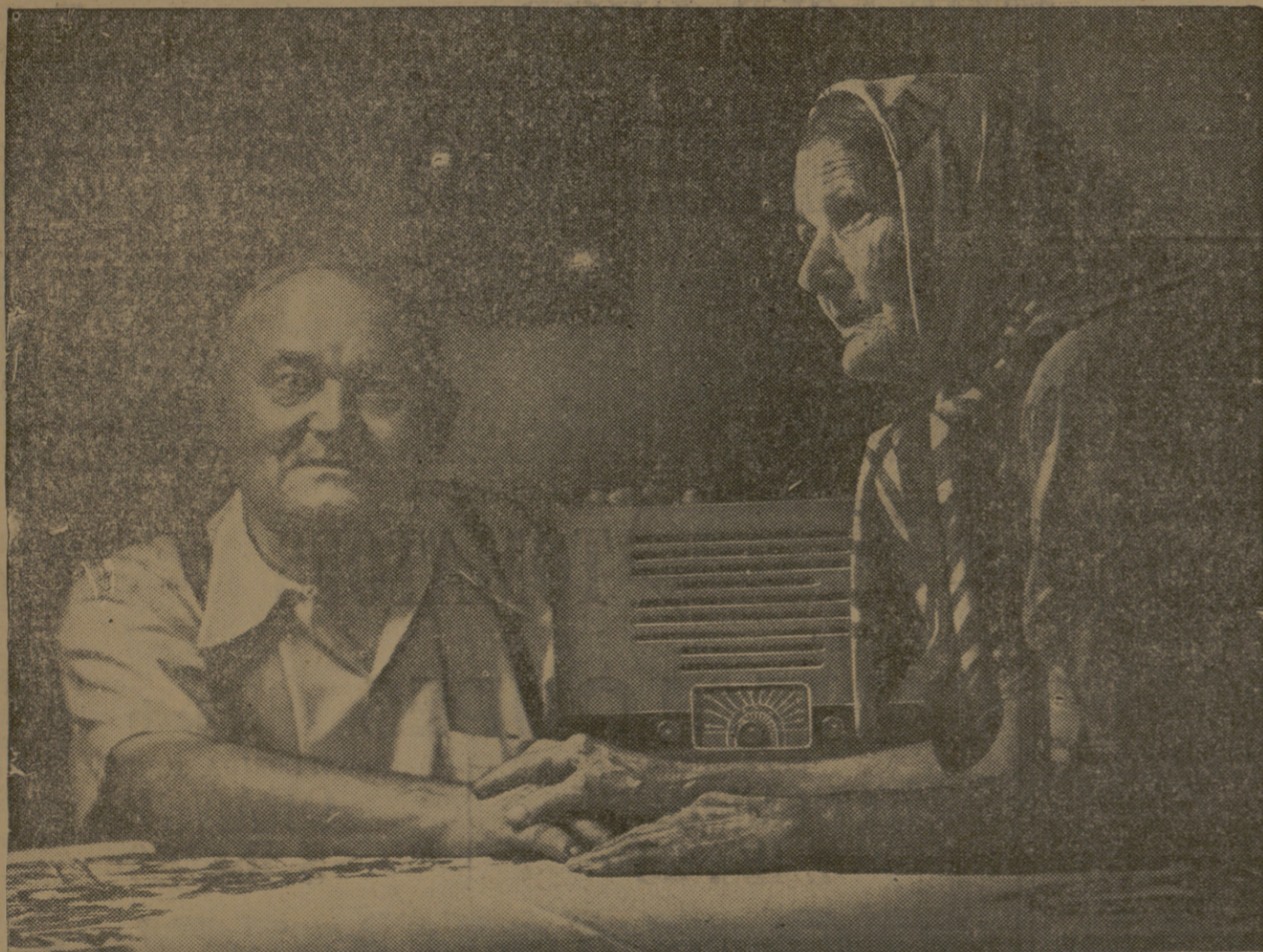
The oil paintings will be rehung in the lobby and several of them will be lighted.

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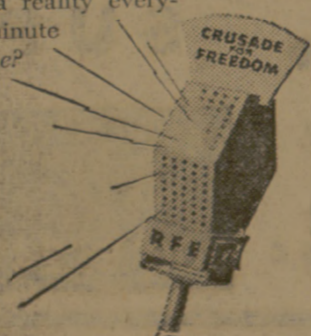
