

Fish Lose to Wharton; Play Allen Nine Today

Wharton Junior College built up a huge lead in the early innings to defeat the Aggie Fish, 12-10, yesterday afternoon in Bryan's Travis Park.

The Fish play Allen Academy at the Allen diamond in Bryan today at 3 p.m.

Wharton, which lost a 4-3 game earlier to the Fish at Wharton, jumped on starter John Martin for seven runs on seven hits and three walks in the first three innings.

The Cadet Fish, although losing, outthit the Wharton nine, 16-10. Earl Rudes came on to pitch for the Aggie first-year men in the third with none away and before he retired the side, three more runs came in for a 10-3 Wharton bulge.

Coach Les Palmer's Fish collected three runs in the second inning, two more in the third and battled back for five in the sixth, but could never catch the visiting Bulldogs. Wharton scored single tallies in the fourth and fifth frames.

Outfielder Larry Minaldi of Nederland hit a single, double and

a triple in five trips to the plate for the Fish, while Wendell Reed of Jefferson hit four for six to pace the A&M freshmen's 16-hit attack. Reed also drove in three runs.

John Marshall got credit for the Wharton win, but had to receive help from reliever Elmer Rod. Rod came in in the last of the eighth

with a man on first and none out. Martin was the losing hurler.

Houston outfielder Cliff Tuttle and shortstop David Balke of Baytown were two other sparks in the Fish's assault on Bulldog pitching. Both Tuttle and Balke collected two hits in four tries, and both drove in two runs.

Victorious Here, Ags Go to Kansas

With their most decisive victory of the 1956 season behind them, A&M's hopeful track team travels to Lawrence, Kansas, this weekend for the third big cinder show of the year, the Kansas Relays.

The improving Aggies took the measure of Rice and SMU on Kyle Field last Saturday, scoring 85 points to the Owls' 61 and the Poles' 26. The SMU freshmen won

the frosh meet with 76 points, followed by Rice's 55 and A&M's 31.

Coach Frank Anderson's Cadets scored 47 of their points in the field events with Bobby Gross and Oran Helvey turning in the finest performances of their careers. Gross spun the discus 170-2 for one of the best distances in the nation this season and Helvey upset Rice's Ed Keasler with a fine throw of 199-5 in the javelin.

A&M swept the first three places in the shot put and finished first, third and fourth in the discus. The Aggie shot putters had an aggregate distance of 204-8 1/4 with Tom Bonorden winning, Gross second and Herman Johnson third.

"I doubt if there's another college in the nation with four shot putters who can put the shot such a combined distance," said Coach Anderson.
