QUICK COFFEE CAKE WITH CRUMB TOPPING

1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt

1 egg
1/2 cup milk
3 T. melted shortening

Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together. Beat egg and add milk and shortening. Stir liquids into dry ingredients, mixing only enough to dampen all the flour. Pour into greased pan, sprinkle with crumb topping (recipe below) and bake in hot oven (425 degrees) 25 minutes. Makes one 9 x 9 inch coffee cake. Serve while hot.

CRUMB TOPPING

2 T. butter (melted)
2 T. sugar
1/4 cup sifted flour

1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
1/2 t. cinnamon

Mix to consistency of coarse crumbs and sprinkle over cake batter before baking.

RINKTUM DITTY

1 small onion, chopped fine
1 T. butter
2 cups cooked tomatoes
1 t. salt

3/4 t. pepper
2 t. sugar
1/2 lb. cheese, grated
1 egg, beaten

Cooked onion in butter until tender. Add tomatoes, salt, pepper, and sugar and heat. Add cheese and cook until melted, stirring constantly. Add egg, stirring constantly, and cook one minute longer. Serve on buttered toast. Serves 4.

Methodists Hear Minister

Dr. John (Dixie) Southern will address the A. & M. Methodist Men Wednesday evening at 6:30 in the Fellowship Hall of A. & M. Methodist Church in College Station.

Dr. Southern speaks on "Humanity's Millions—Our Opportunity," according to Dr. John Kinnannon, president of Methodist Men, and Rev. Nolan R. Vance, pastor of the A. & M. Methodist Church. The talk will deal with the people and problems of South Asia, particularly India and Pakistan.

Dr. Southern was in Pakistan in 1953 in charge of the village development program for Point IV technical assistance, U. S. Foreign Operations Administration. He also traveled extensively in India observing that nations' village development program and land reform measures.
