

# High Schoolers Will Compete For Awards

More than 500 high school boys from all over Texas will compete in College Station this weekend for 70 Opportunity Award Scholarships to A&M College, valued at from \$800 o \$1,600.

Examinations will be given on the two Saturdays to allow all applicants a chance to take advantage of one of the dates. A total of 509 applications were reported up to April 16 at the office of R. G. Perryman, assistant registrar of the college, who will be in charge of giving the examinations.

Winners of the scholarships are selected by the A&M Faculty Committee on Scholarships, after coosideration of each candidate's scholastic record, character, evidence of leadership in high school, financial circumstances and grade on the annual competitive examin-

The scholarships carry from \$200 to \$400 in aid each year for four years, plus part-time employment at the college if needed. They are renewed each year as long as the holder's academic and conduct record is satisfactory.

The program started here in 1946. Since that time 712 Opportunity Awards have been made-305 students at the college are currently enrolled on these scholar-


