Three More Put On NCAA Trial

NEW ORLEANS—The National Athletic Assn's Council Wednesday placed Auburn on probation for three years and warned the school that any infractions during the period may lead to expulsion from the NCAA.

Auburn's probation period was the longest ever handed down by the NCAA. One other Southeastern Conference school, the University of Florida, and the University of Louisville also were placed on probation. Their probationations are for two years.

The school's football team was made ineligible also for participation in the national television series administered by the NCAA. THE UNIVERSITY of Louisville's basketball team was ruled ineligible to participate in the NCAA Tournament and a selected group of invitational meets which coordinate with the NCAA. Those tournaments include the All-College Tournament at Oklahoma City, Okla., the Holiday Festival at New York, the National Invitational Tournament and the Sugar and Cotton Bowl Tournaments.

The University of Florida's athletes were ruled ineligible to enter athletes or teams in NCAA competition and those invitational events which cooperate with the NCAA in the administration of its enforcement program.

The NCAA's ACTION on Auburn supported rulings earlier this year by the Southeastern Conference. The Council said it found that a staff member of the university, assistant football coach Hal Herring, during Nov. 1955, offered financial aid to two prospective student-athletes in excess of that permitted by the NCAA and the Southeastern Conference.

The Southeastern Conference placed Auburn on probation for an indefinite period in the same case. LOUISVILLE ALSO was found guilty of offering two prospective student athletes financial aid in excess of that permitted by the NCAA.

REGALIA FOR BACCALAUREATE SERMON AND COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES
