Is it guards in every building, a secret police system, or will it come from us in the form of self discipline, in that we refuse to lower ourselves, our friends and our school by dishonorable actions?


Surprisingly enough, there is a certain pride in saying, "I may have failed that exam, but I was honest," as in contrast of having passed but not on our own.




