## Family Favorites

### APPLESAUCE SOUFLÉ

¾ cup canned applesauce 3 eggs, separated  
1 T. lemon juice 1 T. quick-cooking granulated rice cereal  
1 t. sugar  
¼ t. salt 2 T. butter or margarine  
Mix applesauce, lemon juice, sugar and salt in top of double boiler. Bring to a boil. Sprinkle rice cereal over mixture and continue to boil, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens—about 2 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in butter. Beat egg yolks until lemon colored. Stir a little of the applesauce into egg yolks and then, stirring constantly, pour back gradually into cooked mixture. Cool. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into rice mixture. Pour into lightly greased deep 1-quart baking dish. Bake slow (325 degrees) in oven 35 minutes. ~ Makes 4 to 6 servings.

### NEW COLE SLAW

¾ cup undiluted evaporated milk 2 t. sugar  
¼ cup mayonnaise ¼ t. celery seed  
½ t. tabasco sauce ¼ t. salt  
2 T. cider vinegar 2 large oranges (sectioned).  
1 t. dry mustard 6 cups shredded green cabbage (lightly packed)  
Stir evaporated milk gradually into mayonnaise until smooth. Stir in Tabasco, vinegar, mustard, sugar, celery seed and salt. Dice the sections from one orange; add to cabbage and turn into serving dish. Pour dressing over and toss lightly. Garnish with remaining orange sections. Makes 6 servings.

### CREAMY CHICKEN HASH

This dish can be baked to a bubbling brown while you set the table and make a salad. Hot crusty garlic bread is also a good accompaniment to the chicken casserole.  
½ cup instant cream 2 cups diced cooked chicken  
4 T. flour grated Parmesan or Romano cheese  
1½ cups seasoned chicken broth paprika  
1 pkg. (12 oz.) quick-frozen potato patties  
Stir instant cream and flour together thoroughly in a saucepan. Gradually stir in the chicken broth with a whisk or a fork so mixture is smooth. Cook and stir constantly over moderate heat until boiling and thickened. Place frozen potato patties in bottom of shallow casserole; a deep heat-resistant glass pie plate is perfect to use. Arrange chicken over patties. Pour sauce over chicken. Sprinkle generously with grated cheese; sprinkle with paprika. Bake in moderate (375 degrees) oven until top is browned and sauce is bubbly—about 25 minutes. Poke a fork under chicken and sauce and try potatoes to make sure they are cooked. Makes 4 servings.
