### Enrollment Expected To Increase

Enrollment at A&M for the 1956 fall semester is expected to be 7,400 persons, according to H. L. Heaton, registrar.

The expected 7,400 persons will be about an 8% increase over the 6,846 persons enrolled last fall.

Considering enrollment figures for a two year period, this shows an upward trend in enrollment. 1954 enrollment was 6,159.

The current semester enrollment is 6,041.
