

HS Teachers Complete Physics Course

Thirty Texas high school teachers, from schools in 24 counties, have completed a six-week training institute for Texas High School Physics Teachers sponsored jointly by industry and A&M.

The institute was operated by the Department of Physics of the college and expenses of enrollees were paid by 16 industrial organizations. A cash fellowship of \$250 was given each student at the beginning of the course, covering fees of \$46.50 and allowing a margin of compensation for loss of earnings during the training period.

Directed by Dr. J. G. Potter, head of the Department of Physics, the institute was designed to increase the number of qualified high school physics teachers in Texas. Admission to the course was dependent on the teacher's having a strong background of training in mathematics and science.

Training was given through lecture and laboratory sessions totaling 21 hours per week with special classes conducted by guest lecturers from other colleges and from Texas industrial firms.

Completion of the course allows the teacher-students six hours of graduate credit applicable to advanced college degrees.

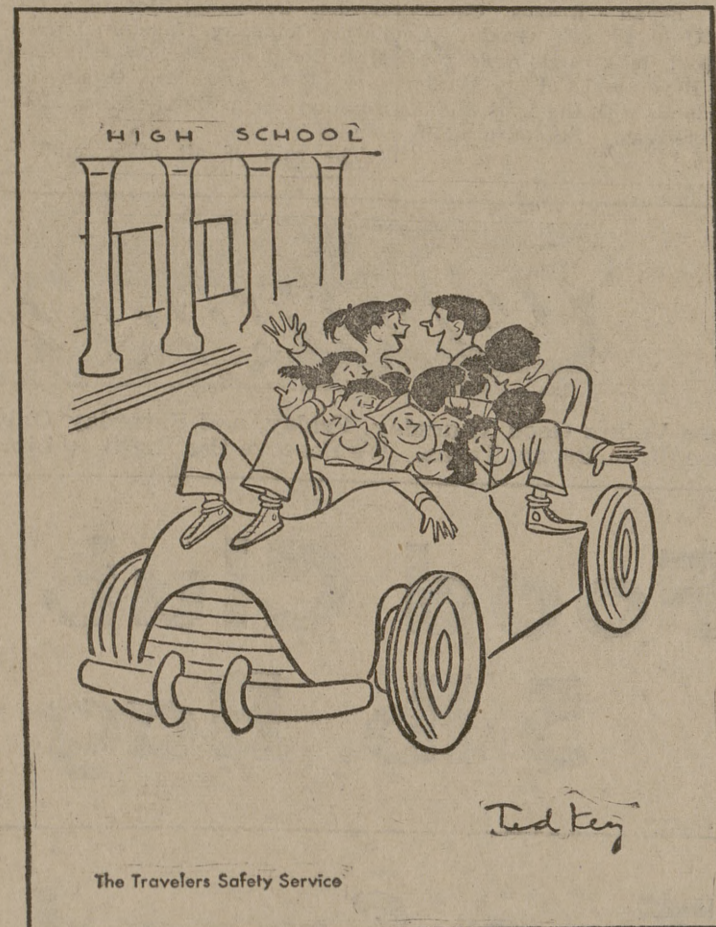
Couple's Bridge

The menu has been planned to include spaghetti with meat sauce, Parmesan cheese, cole slaw, French bread, and ice tea.

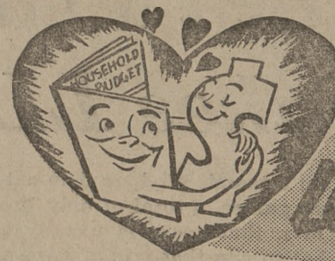

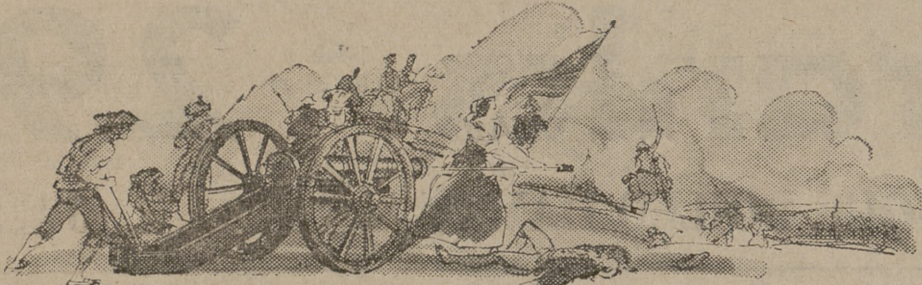
