

# Aggies Remember '54; Battle Tech in Dallas

Remembering the worst lacing that Bear Bryant has received in his two-plus years in the Southwest Conference, the Aggies open the Texas State Fair against Texas Tech at 8 p. m. Saturday in the Cotton Bowl.

Two years ago Coach Dewitt Weaver ran up a 41-9 score in Bryant's Southwest curtain raiser, a bitter pill for one of the nation's finest coaches. Eight Aggies face

13 Red Raiders from that same 1954 game, but times have changed and so has the caliber of A&M teams.

Jack Pardee, Don Watson, Bebes Stallings, Bobby Drake, Keith, Dee Powell, Dennis Goehring, Lloyd Hale and Bobby Lockett were principles in the '54 contest that saw the Aggies lose 10 fumbles to the Lubbock team. Weaver never called off the dogs, but left his first bunch in there to run up the score, something the "original

eight" can't forget.

Across the line will be ends Ken Vakey, Dan Law, Pat Hartsfield and Bobby Young, tackle Bob Kilcullen, guards Hal Broadfoot and Doug Campbell, center Barton Massey, quarterbacks, Don Williams and Buddy Hill and halfbacks Ronnie Herr, M. C. Northam, and Hugh Fewin.

Three of Bryant's Cadets will see little or no action in Dallas, with one out for sure. Goehring, Loyd Taylor, and Murry Trimble will see limited duty while tackle A. L. Simmons will not make it.

"I don't know yet whether Goehring, Taylor or Trimble will play any Saturday," said Coach Bryant. "It's all up to the doctor, but Simmons will definitely not play."

## SPORTS PLANTS

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It's back to the coin-flipping and grid-guessing department again with time out to add—that out of six "predictions" last week, fate smiled and I hit 'em all. That's nothing short of a miracle in the Southwest, and my hat still won't fit.

Tomorrow's schedule finds TCU and Arkansas clashing in Fort Worth for the Southwest Conference curtain raiser. A&M will be right next door facing Texas Tech in Dallas while SMU journeys to Missouri. Texas entertains West Virginia in Memorial Stadium and Rice hosts LSU. Both Baylor and Houston are on the road, the Bears taking on Maryland and the Cougars will be in Mississippi against Ole Miss.

The Aggies are pretty much the worse from a bad attack of virus influenza and a bevy of injuries in the LSU game, but Tech's Red Raiders have one of their weakest teams in many a year. A&M should put a third loss on Tech's record Saturday night in Dallas.

The Fort Worth battle should be terrific. The Horned Frogs had last week off after crushing Kansas, 32-0, while Arkansas has won twice against lesser opponents. The Hogs will probably be fired up, but Jim Swink and Co. are too much for them.

Baylor tries an up-to-now giant in collegiate ranks, Maryland in College Park, but the easterners are without Coach Jim Tatum, who took them to their grid heights. The Bears of Waco, with fullbacks Charley Dupre and Rubeen Saage back in shape, will put loss number two on the Terrapins '56 record.

Rice meets a highly underrated LSU team tomorrow night in Houston and it should be another donnybrook in the stadium. The Tigers must put down the passes of King Hill and Frank Ryan to win it.

SMU's 12th-ranked Ponies, college football's biggest surprise team of 1956, cruise into the midwest against Missouri. Charley Arnold and his team of racchorses should speed past

Missouri without a great deal of trouble.

Walter Fondren, Vince Matthews and the Texas Longhorns face a tough West Virginia team tomorrow in Austin. It'll be another offensive battle with Fondren's gift to the difference.

The Cougars, victors over Mississippi State, 18-7, last week, find tougher opposition in 'Ole Miss. This could go either way, but it's in Mississippi.

# Tigers, Buffaloes Here at 8 Tonight

Consolidated's Tigers and the Giddings Buffaloes match identical records tonight at 8 p. m. on Tiger Field as Coach Horace Schaffer's team tries to break its touchdown drought.

Both squads own 1-3 season records, but the Buffaloes are better than their mark shows. Comparable scores find Giddings 25 points over CHS, having lost 21-0 to powerful Rockdale while the Tigers were humbled, 46-0, by Rockdale.

Once again the hometown Bengals find themselves undermanned and outweighed, this week by a mere 18 pounds-per-man. Consolidated weighs in at 150 while Giddings throws a 168 average at the Tigers.

Bill Kavanaugh, the Bengals' leading rusher, has been slowed by injuries this week and will not

start, although he will probably play some on the defense. John Wayne Todd replaces him at fullback.

Offensive starters for Consolidated find Dan Davis at left end, Mike Walton at left tackle, Garland Andrews at left guard, Steadman Davis at center, either David McNeely or James Couch at right guard, Pete Rodriguez at right tackle, George Carroll at right end.

In the backfield will be quarterback Alton Arnold, halfbacks Bill Hall and Dee Smith and fullback Todd.
