World War Fears Rise As Nations Take Sides

JERUSALEM, Tuesday, Oct. 30—(AP)—Israeli armed forces struck deep into Egypt's Sinai Peninsula today and were unofficially reported only 18½ miles from the Suez

War fears rose around the world. Egypt's army confirmed the invasion but said there had been no armed clash up until 4 p.m. EST Monday. Egypt has been staging military maneuvers in the Sinai

Its strength there is not known. A high Israeli government source said the operation was designed to wipe out Egyptian commando nests in Sinai. The Israeli forces were remaining in the area, not with-
