UT's Price Throws in Towel

AUSTIN, (AP)—Ed Price, the winningest coach in Southwest Conference competition during his tenure, Wednesday resigned as head football coach of the University of Texas effective Dec. 31, 1956.

Price, 47, now in the middle of his sixth season as head coach at his alma mater, addressed his res-

ignation to the athletic council, submitting it through Athletic Director Dana X. Bible.

"No official pressure has been placed upon me to resign, and I appreciate that, too," Price said in his resignation.

Dr. O. B. Williams, chairman of the council, indicated no action will be taken to name a successor

until the current season is completed.

Price has one more year on his present \$12,500 yearly contract and Bible steps out next September.

Some alumni had been calling for Price's scalp, saying the university should hire a football coach who would also be the director.



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
