Undefeated in League, SMU Scores Anytime

A&M's footballers were back in pads Tuesday with their attention concentrated on stopping the "home-run" play of SMU.

"SMU goes for the home-run play—long touchdown runs or passes," said Assistant Coach Jerry Claiborne after scouting the Mustangs against Texas. "They're capable of scoring on anybody at any time. Most of their touchdowns have been either long runs or long passes."

Fresh from their convincing 27-0 victory over Arkansas, Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant's Aggies worked on trying to recognize the SMU offense with a minimum of contact work.

"SMU both runs and passes very well," commented Bryant on his Saturday opponent. "They've played some real good teams. We're afraid of a bunch of 'em, especially that (Charlie) Arnold, (Char-

ley) Jackson, (Ron) Slaughter and (Willard) Dewveall."

Arnold is the Southwest Conference's second leading passer and total offense producer. Arn-

old has passed 100 times, completed 48 for 710 yards and eight touchdowns.

Jackson holds down second place in the league's ground-gaining department with 441 yards gained on 67 trips for an average gain of 6.6 yards. Arkansas' George Nesbitt has 480 yards, but has played in seven games, one more than Jackson.

Slaughter is seventh among the conference's pass catchers with 164 yards and one score on nine completions. Mustang end Tommy Gentry is fourth in this category with 170 yards on 15 snares and two touchdowns.

The Ponies of Dallas are undefeated in conference play, having scored one-point victories over Rice (14-13) and Texas (20-19). SMU held a staggering 20-0 lead over the Longhorns last Saturday in Austin, but couldn't do anything right in the second portion, as the Steers went wild, almost winning in the final seconds.

Slimes Seek Third Victory Over Fish Here Tomorrow

The Rice Institute Slimes, SWC surprise squad of the year, tackle A&M's on-off Fish Thursday night at 7:30 on Kyle Field. Wins over highly-touted Texas University

and Del Mar Junior College indicate a polished team from the Houston school.

One of A&M's brightest stars, Gordon LeBeouf of Port Neches, will collide with an old teammate from his fabulous high school days. Bobby LaBorde who led the Owlets in rushing against powerful Del Mar is billed as an "all-purpose back" for the hard-hitting Slime eleven and, like LeBeouf, helped pave the way for his high school's 1955 state crown.

Pacemakers of the Rice Frosh attack currently are quarterback Larry Dueitt of Corpus Christi, who passed once and ran once for touchdowns against Del Mar, duplicating his feat against Texas. Gordon Speer, a Barbers Hill speed merchant, caught a Dueitt TD pass in the Del Mar encounter and had

two long touchdown runs against SMU.

The big difference in the two teams quite likely may hinge upon the Milstead question. If the hefty Tyler quarterback can play Thursday night, popular thought will swing harder toward the Fish than otherwise.
